Village Hall news

The Management Committee met on Wednesday 6 December 2023. Those present were Eileen Oliver, Chairperson; Richard Crawley, Secretary; Jane Kelly, Booking Clerk; Pete Twissell, Parish Council representative; Terry Cook, Alison Frank, Rosemary Pratt, Chris Dalton and Tracey Hayden. Apologies for non-attendance had been received from Graham Dye and Jay Lucas. The minutes of the last meeting were agreed and signed. Hirers will be reminded of the rules of hire covering bouncy castles which must not obstruct emergency exits. An urn has been provided for Fawns as requested. In the Memorial Hall kitchen two new kettles have been supplied in the hope that these may discourage use of urn as safety issues are involved. Car park lines are awaiting repainting when weather permits.

The hall passed its inspection for evidence of RAAC.

Thanks were given to those who helped with the Christmas decorations throughout the hall. The Memorial Hall clock is now up and running again.

Provision of office space for the Parish Council was discussed, possibly in the Office or Cloakroom which would help integrate the Village Hall with the village and its life. It was agreed that the Office needed clearing and tidying and that the use of the Cloakroom could become a small meeting space.

The issue of a parent refusing to abide by the car park permit system run by the parents was mentioned. The Primary School Head has made it clear to this parent that her behaviour is unacceptable. The parent has been written to and offered the chance to speak if she has a point to make but no reply so far.

A review of hall charges was due in January for application in April. Setting a higher rate for commercial hirers was expected of us and would be considered at the review. A good income from bookings in October and November was reported with some income from the performance of "Horseplay" thanks to the 75 people attending.

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The Memorial Hall is booked for an election on the first Thursday in May. Bookings remain steady, including productions booked for fEast in March and June, the Village Walk on Monday 1 January, War Games weekend and the Players' contribution to retain use of the Memorial Hall during panto week. In view of parties not being properly cleaned up after use, a deposit or extra cleaning charge may have to be considered. It was suggested that, after Christmas, the use of the Office and Cloakroom should be looked at.

Village Electricals has managed to source the correct batteries for the obsolete alarms and will return soon to fit them. One of the lighting tubes cannot be retrofitted and will need to be changed. The quotations for the stage curtains have been arriving at various prices and ideas. It was suggested these were discussed at the January meeting when perhaps all committee members are in attendance.

The gardener has fitted the gutter guards and continues to keep the grounds tidy. He will make monthly visits during the winter and resume regular grass cutting in the spring. Unfortunately a recent party left the

hall in quite a mess. Various areas had been covered in glitter and there were still some helium balloons on the ceiling. The floor has been V-mopped, washed, hoovered and mopped again several times but it still resembles a disco ball in places and will need some more work. The kitchen too was left with balloons on worktops, in sinks, bins left full and ribbons had been tied to table legs. The dishwasher was still on and was full of cups, etc.

The hall has been suffering some internal wall damage of late and general neglect by various hirers. Old Buckenham are the only hall within the local area that hires without asking for a deposit in cleared funds pre-event. Other halls, eg Kenninghall, Banham, New Buckenham, Eccles and East Harling, implement deposits. A summary report will be made for the next meeting.

Any final amendments to the draft Constitution document are needed before it goes back to the contact at CAN. It was pointed out that, as trustees, the committees duty is to run the Village Hall for the benefit of the inhabitants of the parish of Old Buckenham rather than the interests of the organisation a

Old Buckenham Parish Council

These notes have been written by the newsletter editor from the draft minutes and so may contain information that is amended at a later date.

Old Buckenham Parish Council met on Thursday 7 December at 7pm in Old Buckenham Village Hall. Those present were councillors Naomi Bailey (Chair), Pete Twissell, Stan Burton, Steve Gowers, Lesley Evison and David Taylor. Apologies for not being able to attend had been received from Doug Irons and Ali McWilliam. Also attending were Jonn Hicks (Clerk) and three members of the public.

The minutes of the meeting held on Thursday 2 November were approved (5 in favour).

Financial matters. The Community Account balance was currently at £26,815.44.

Payments of £1188.99 were approved (4 in favour). These included £262.1 for the community car drivers, £495.33 for the salary of the Clerk and RFO, £62.20 for new bulbs for the Christmas tree on the Green, £125 for electrical services and £30.95 for batteries to go in the defibrillators.

Councillor reports. Naomi Bailey reported on problems at both schools regarding cars parking on footpaths. She has spoken to all parties involved and both agreed to send letters to parents asking for this to cease. Naomi Bailey had also received a letter from a resident regarding the overflowing water at the Ottomer Pond and she will write to resident. Steve Gowers will speak to John Frost to investigate where the overflow pipe is, if there is one.

Naomi Bailey then made a statement regarding the picnic benches on the Green outside the Ox and Plough. These have now been removed from the Green for the winter as the correct paperwork was not submitted for them to remain there for the winter. She also asked that if any resident has an issue with this, that they attend the Parish Council meeting (which is held the first Thursday of every



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month) and not voice their anger via social media. They can then voice their opinion so that any questions they may have can be answered.

Lesley Evison reported that Prince Harry's Wood has a large amount of rubbish to be cleared. Steve Gowers now has the correct number of volunteers to enable the Speedwatch group to restart. More are still required so that he can set up more than one group and enable the a larger presence in the village. Also there are an increasing number of HGVs flouting the weight limit on Hargham Road. The Clerk to write to local companies to make them aware we will be watching and reporting to the authorities.

Pete Twissell has completed the hedge planting on the recreation ground. He also confirmed the Village Hall Management Committee will allow the Parish Council to open an office within the Village Hall in January. The Clerk and the Parish Council would like to thank Norwich Lighting Centre for the donation of 50 clear LED bulbs for the Christmas tree. *Green Report.* The Green has had its final cut for 2023 and also the areas around the trees have been

cut back. Thanks to Suggitts for their service again this year.

Planning applications. There were no new planning applications, no amended applications, no planning decisions by Breckland and no planning appeals to be considered. Precept Grants. After discussion the following awards were made: Monday Mardle, applied for £125, granted £125.

Almshouses Trust, applied for £1000, granted £500.

Pre Loved, applied for £200, granted £200.

Fawns Playgroup, applied for £468, granted £200.

Old Buckenham Windmill, applied for £1000, granted £1000.

Open Produce Show, applied for £500, granted £250.

Primary School Families Association, applied for £500, granted £250.

Old Buckenham Village Hall, applied for £1000, granted £1000. *Public participation.* Nothing from the public.

Items for next agenda. These included the Precept, situation with solar farm, Green issues update and footpath from Village Hall to Chapel Green School.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Thursday 4 January at

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7.30pm in Old Buckenham Village Hall.

Uncle Alf's leg

This piece has been written by Richard Crawley of Fen Street who was struck by a thought arising from Remembrance Day. He was intrigued to think about what an inanimate body part might get up to on its own. Given that, sadly, we have so many brave people coping with life having lost limbs, many as a result of overseas conflicts that the country sent them to, it got him thinking about the other side of the coin - what a prosthetic limb might want to do if it could. Clearly this is a far-fetched idea, but harnessed to a national event like Remembrance Sunday when we "celebrate" those who died or suffered on our behalf, he thought the story would convey some genuine pathos despite the unlikely setting. He hopes the

sentiments of loyalty, courage and sacrifice and of a certain kind of love, make themselves felt in the story.

Glass exploded from my bedroom window as did uncle Alf's leg, hitting the ground running, running for the open road. I dashed out of the front door after it but Alf had been a paralympic sprinter in his day and there was no contest. I scrambled into the car and took off after the disappearing limb. I was within yards of cutting it off when a bus pulled out of a side road. I slowed, the bus came to a stop and Alf's leg bounded aboard. Before I could leap from the car, the bus took off leaving me no option but to follow its route into town. This gave me time to think. Uncle Alf's leg had had its moments before, rattling inside my wardrobe to be let out but often content with a sprint round the back garden. It wasn't Alf's athletic leg, that had been buried with him. This was the proto-limb, the first to be fitted after the IED blew his limb off at the knee in Helmand. He left it to me. his favourite niece, because I had enjoyed his army tales long after I'd sussed out the embroidery he'd woven into them. No, he hadn't lost it in a game of poker. Nor had

he sawn it off to eat when he was stranded alone in darkest
Afghanistan for five weeks. But it was fun borrowing it as a make-do cricket stump or rounders bat, sometimes sticking it in the sand next to his good foot after I'd buried him on our seaside holidays.

Long after his death, Alf's prosthetic, dented in places from haymakers and roughened from salt and sand, insisted on attending the Remembrance Day at the local war memorial as he had done when alive. I would accompany him, proud to see those of his comrades who remained turn up to honour his presence with a friendly tap on his shin or a stamp on his foot. Foremost among these was of course Captain James who had rescued Alf after the detonation and brought him to safety and surgery at considerable risk under enemy fire. The Captain was decorated for this and at every other November 11th pinned the ribbon on the breast of Alf's tunic and Alf duly returned the gesture the following year. This continued even when the leg stood alone beside me, returning the ribbon or receiving it from the captain and attaching it somehow to uncle's

leg. But last year there was no Captain James.

That's when the misbehaviour in the wardrobe started up again. Even the garden couldn't contain Alf's leg; if not tethered to a tree with a circular range of freedom like a goat, he would bound over gate or hedge and run amok. Neighbours complained. The police came out but went back convinced the whole thing was stirred up by vindictive neighbours letting their imaginations run away with them which of course a false leg could not.

By now the bus had made three stops without Alf hopping off. I wondered what his fellow passengers thought of him taking up a seat or unselfishly occupying the luggage area. Like the police they probably looked the other way and refused to entertain the possibility of a leg taking a freebie bus ride.

Finally Alf alighted and turned down a side road. I followed, undecided whether to stop and catch hold of him, or find out whether he was going anywhere in particular or just doing a runner for fun.

No fun at all as it turned out; the route ended at the cemetery

gates. I parked and followed Alf at a discreet distance. He edged towards a gathering huddled round a graveside. I sneaked to a space at the back but Alf nudged his way through to the very front, beside the priest and the chief mourners. The proceedings had reached the stage where a tall man in black was casting soil into the grave on top of the coffin. All was silent save for the patter of earth on wood. The solemn tension was broken by a resounding thwack as Alf flung himself on top of the coffin. A restrained gasp went up. I pushed forward to stand between the priest and the chief mourner and babbled my apologies. "It's Alf Biggins, my uncle. I mean

"It's Alf Biggins, my uncle. I mean it's his leg, I'm so sorry. For some reason he . . . well he has been buried but he appears to want to "

"That's my wife" he said, pointing to the grave.

"I'm sorry" I moaned, "I'll retrieve it if you'll allow me" I asked, looking from him to the priest for permission to invade the grave.

The priest was lost for words but the tall man reached for my hand and spoke.

"Perhaps I can explain. Sylvia, my wife, would be known to your uncle as Captain James."
I gripped his hand hard and wouldn't let go. Then the tears came.

"Let him stay there," he continued. "Sylvia would have wanted it. He owed his life to her. Let him pay his tribute."
I stood as the earth pattered down, some of it from my own trembling hands. When we had finished I took his hand again as we walked away from the grave. We had no need to speak. I knew his thought as he knew mine, just as Alf and Sylvia knew, that there are bonds in life that run silent and deep and long.
