for not being able to attend. Also present were Clerk John Hicks and fifteen members of the public. The minutes of the meeting held on Thursday 4 January were approved (6 in favour).

Financial matters. The Community account balance now stands at £22674.54. Payments for approval (6 in favour) were £1246.86 which included £106.75 to the community car drivers, allotment rent of £450, stationary and postage £43.50, Clerk and RFO salary £510.34, hire of Methodist Chapel £15 and purchase of St George Flag £115.27.

Councillors' reports. Stan Burton said that he has the Christmas tree lights stored in his barn and they can remain there for the year. Steve Gower reported that the Speed Watch training will be in the Methodist Chapel on Friday 16 February. Doug Irons said that he has sent content to the web designers and was awaiting their reply.

Naomi Bailey reported that she and the Clerk attended a meeting in January regarding this year's maintenance of the footpath between the Primary School and Chapel Green School. It was agreed that the Parish Council will cut the grass, Primary School will cut and maintain the hedge and Chapel Green School will maintain the footpath surface.

Green Report. The Chair, Stan Burton, Lesley Evison and the Clerk attended a meeting in the Methodist Church in January with two members of the Green Working Party, John Fernihough and Sarah Dye. Naomi Bailey set out the rules of a working party to all and was agreed by everyone to re-start this with everyone aware of how the working party should work and who is permitted to attend. It was agreed by all that Suggitt Farm Services will continue to cut the Green three times a year at the cost of £500 per cut, Stuart Barker to remain as the village handyman at the same price as last year. Any other works that need performing will only proceed once a job card has been issued by the Clerk and approved by the Parish Council to avoid any confusion. It was also pointed out that any work carried out on or around the Green are subject to insurance and risk assessment being provided to the Parish Council as well as a method statement before any works commence.

Westward, The Green, NR17 1RR. Proposed change of use of existing barn and outbuildings to a single residential dwelling (3PL/2023/1204/F). Proposal to support was approved (5 in favour 1 abstain).

Crown House, Stacksford, NR17 1PD. Demolition of outbuilding. Erection of 2no. single storey extensions and a cart shed with storage above (3PL/2024/0060/HOU).

Proposal to support was approved (6 in favour).

Chestnuts, Mill Road, NR17 1SG. Horse Chestnut trees, target prune the trees to clear the overhead utilities and bracing from the telegraph pole. T3 Scots Pine tree, Prune back the upper laterals overhanging the roof line and functioning chimney of the dwelling "Chestnuts2" by no more than 2.0m

(TRE/2024/0018/TCA). Proposal to support was approved (6 in favour).

Planning decisions by Breckland. Stacksford Grange Road from Stacksford Lane to Hargham Road (3PL/2023/1025/EU). Certificate of Lawfulness for Existing Use (CLUED) for the use of the dwelling known as

Stacksford Grange in breach of the agricultural occupation condition attached to planning permission 3PL/1988/1300/O.

Traffic issues. Numerous members of the public attended the meeting to voice their concerns with traffic issues around the village. It was accepted that this needs addressing so a meeting has been called at the Memorial Room on Saturday 24 February at 10am. The clerk will invite the NCC Highways officer and Steve Askew to attend to try and answer questions from the public. Concerns were raised by public around the large amount of flooding in the village in recent weeks. Clerk to speak with Highways regarding ditches that need cleaning and Ron Brewer has put a piece in the village newsletter asking residents to ensure drains and any ditches on their property are kept clear **Public participation.** Adrian Joel reported that a former Parish Council member Derek Smalley has died. He also reported that the community car scheme is looking for new drivers.

Items for next agenda. These will include updates on Solar Farm and flooding update

News from the Village Hall

The Village Hall Management Committee met on Wednesday 7 February. Those present were Eileen Oliver, Chairperson; Richard Crawley, Secretary; Jane Kelly, Booking Clerk; Pete Twissell, Parish Council representative; Jay Lucas, Hall Manager; Rosemary Pratt; Alison Frank; Tracey Hayden and Chris Dalton. Apologies for nonattendance had been received from Terry Cook and Graham Dye. The minutes of the last meeting were agreed and signed.

Matters arising from these minutes included the crack in floor between kitchen and fover in Memorial Hall, It will be checked and if it worsens, a building inspector will be consulted. A quote for replacement curtains to be delayed until accounts for 2023 are settled. Unacceptable and insanitary rubbish has been placed in the outside bins. The perpetrators may be identified via the hall's CCTV which may help by providing a specific date and time that this occurred. The issue of clearing the office was raised and it was agreed that this should be done. The Parish Council continues to make use of the village hall office and will start up a monthly Parish surgery in the Memorial Hall on the

last Saturday of the month from 10am to 12 noon. An annual rental for use of these facilities is to be paid to the Village Hall. The outside grounds are looking immaculate thanks to the efforts of the Village Hall's gardener. TP Fire and Security are due to carry out the six-monthly maintenance. The treasurer had submitted a report on current hire charges. The hall is increasingly reliant upon paid rather than unpaid/volunteer help and as such some level of price increase seems inevitable. The accounts up to the end of December 2023 are not yet complete but are expected to show a small loss. Now need to hold back increasing charges until the increased costs are looked at. A slightly different arrangement has been agreed with the treasurer of the Old Buckenham Families Association as regards the timing of

future receipts and payments but this is quite complex and will be reported on before seeking approval from the committee. The car park wastepaper bin has collected 2.71 tonnes during 2023 and the hall should receive a useful sum once the claim is processed. Village Electrical have completed their work on the emergency lighting. The oil order should see the hall right through the winter and well into 2024 as, based upon last year, the new boiler and extra insulation has cut the fuel usage noticeably.

Hire charges were discussed. Old Buckenham Village Hall appears to have lower hire charges than other local village halls. Our hall should not be seen to be undercutting other venues, nor, on the other hand, deterring bookings by becoming too expensive. Income has to cover the increases in

labour, materials and energy costs that have increased dramatically nationwide. In addition, they are obliged by the Charity Commission to make a separate and higher charge for commercial bookings. Though difficult to define, the difference between commercial and private bookings was not easy. It was felt that agreement was needed on a percentage increase in addition to the regular charges. A proposal was made that a 25% increase be levied on hire charges for commercial bookings, rounded to the nearest 50p or £1, and subject to negotiation taking into account duration and frequency of hire. This was carried by a unanimous vote. CAN will be asked for clarification on what bookings constitute a commercial charge. A high income for January was reported thanks to the Players' pantomime. A new class in Qi Kong is starting up and Church Bingo restarts in March when the Christian Aid Quiz will also be held. Hollyhock Trilogy, a drama production, will be visiting on Sunday 17 March at 2.30pm. Tea, coffee and cakes will be served, and help will be required for the event. Also fEast are returning in June with a new production. The Hallmaster booking system needs more committee members

able to use it and a promise of more help was greatly appreciated. Village Electricals had carried out the emergency lighting inspection and issued the certificates. The British Gas contract is due for renewal at a much higher standing charge. Direct negotiations with the company have led to a much better deal. It was agreed to should renew the contract on these terms another year.

Car park signage was considered. The speed bump on the exit lane has been replaced. Discussions took place on whether signage should be renewed on the surface or by signs on posts or walls. Applying white arrows in the winter is difficult as the material takes time to set. The best time for the work is the school summer holidays. This work can be expensive especially if a professional firm is contracted. Exit signs are much cheaper and signs on the walls and the fence next to Chapel Green School, plus two signs on posts along the edge of the Recreation Ground were suggested. There is also the issue of having too many notices along the walls of the building that may go unnoticed.

It had been reported that the defibrillator at the Village Hall is not working and the Parish Council has been informed. A meeting between

Read and enjoy

Here is the first of several pieces being supplied by writer Tom Walshe on some local history. He pays homage to a master airman who did Old Buckenham proud. Who's been watching the new TV series "Masters of the Air"? Eighty years ago this month, a movie star arrived at Old Buckenham to take part in a war drama. He was the "Tall Drawl", otherwise known as Jimmy Stewart. And the action was undeniably for real.

Stewart had won his first Oscar in the 1940 movie The Philadelphia Story. A few months later he

stunned film fans - and his production team at MGM - by enlisting as a humble private in the US Army. He was the first Hollywood actor to join up. When a producer asked him why he would give up his screen career for the military, he said "This country's conscience is bigger than all the studios in Hollywood put together, and the time will come when we'll have to fight." How right he was. Within four years, he had risen to the rank of colonel with the Air Force and remains to this day a hero of the American war effort that helped save Europe from the Nazis. After pilot training in the States, James Maitland Stewart, then aged 35, came to South Norfolk in December 1943 as a squadron leader with the 445th Bombardment Group based at Tibenham. He transferred to "Old Buc" (as the Americans dubbed the new aerodrome) a few weeks after

operations began here in February 1944.

The airfield was the new base for the 453rd Bombardment Group and had a mighty fleet of B24 Liberators flying daylight (and therefore very dangerous) missions over Germany and other strategic targets in occupied Europe. Stewart's arrival as Group Operations Officer on 30 March 1944 came three days after his predecessor in the role had been killed during a raid over France. He began with a statement of intent, piloting the lead plane on his first mission on April 13th as 18 "Libs" attacked an aircraft parts factory and repair depot near Munich; all bar one plane made it safely back to Old Buc.

The following day there was a very different duty for Stewart as he helped lead the celebrations at the opening of the Aero Club on base. This facility, run by the Red Cross, gave the men off-duty leisure and respite activities including dances (local girls were regular attendees), along with film shows, a games area and snack bar.

Despite having been assigned to the 453rd "for the duration", his promotion from major to lieutenant-colonel in June 1944 was followed by appointment as an executive officer of the 2nd Bomb Wing, later becoming its deputy commander. As such, he was based at the wing's HQ at Ketteringham Hall.

It is clear, however, that he continued to have a close association with "Old Buc" and took part in more bombing missions from the aerodrome here until operations officially ended in April 1945.

Stewart's official tally of missions is just over twenty. However, all but a handful of those, relate to his time at Tibenham. Most of his later missions went uncredited at his own insistence.

His skill and bravery was recognised though by the prestigious awards that marked his service. He twice received the Distinguished Flying Cross for actions in combat, as well as the French Croix de Guerre and no fewer than four Air Medals. Some of the younger villagers were aware of the presence of a big movie star among the hundreds of airmen who gave the village its whole new status in 1944. But the older generation tended to have less interest in popular American culture and were doubtless more sanguine. War, after all, had no truck with celebrity.

Tom's son John Loveday, now 98, and himself a great recorder of village life from that era, explains: "My dad was out in his car and saw an American plane that had just taken off and looked as if it was going to crash. He realised it would have bombs on board but he sped to where it was coming down. When he got there, he found the door of the plane was jammed and the men couldn't get out. So he took an axe he had with him to the plane and managed to open it enough for a few chaps to escape. Then there was an explosion which blew my Dad off his feet. He was singed quite a bit round the eyebrows and hair." Stewart's unexpected visit to Tom

Loveday at Rod Alley Row was much appreciated and certainly impressed young John, even though he was not home at the time! "Coming to the house to thank my father was a great gesture and very indicative of the type of man he was," says John.

Others have observed that Jimmy Stewart was an exemplary officer

who chose to lead his men in combat, stating that he wouldn't ask them to do anything he wasn't prepared to do himself. He continued to play a role in the United States Air Force Reserve after the war, rising to the rank of Brigadier General in July 1959. And his movie career didn't go badly either!



Tim Bornett's message to *residents:* I write this on the day of the deadline for the March news letter. Absolute chaos going to Attleborough on the B 1075. Major water pipe burst past Bunns Bank. Had to divert to Foundary Lane, met tanker lorries et al. When I returned I went via Attleborough's Hargham Road but could not get through because of floods. Eventually got back via Foundary Lane. Attleborough Town Council stated that lack of infrastructure support was the cause re water pipe burst. I agree. No diversion signs and many motorists decided to remove barriers to get through. The following weekend the same stretch of road was due to be closed for 48 hours for resurfacing! It was excellent to see Attleborough Town Council also helping to support flood victims in part of Attleborough by providing sand bags, etc. Since Christmas last there has been considerable rain and subsequent frosts, plus mud on the roads. At Puddledock bend heading towards Attleborough, rain plus ice plus mud has caused several accidents. Thankfully no serious injuries but a resident has suffered considerable fence damage to his property. Old Buckenham is witnessing many

heavy vehicles entering Old Buckenham, not only on the B1075 but rat running from the A11 via Hargham Road. The Parish Council needs to apply pressure to not only local councils but the Governmentt to insist that adequate investment is provided to ensure infrastructure support. The flooding on the Green around Ottomer pond and at Hargham Road near the Almshouses needs to be a priority for the Parish. Perhaps a start for all the above is for a 20 mph limit on the B1075 at Puddledock bend but with adequate enforcement.


