More about Tony Petley

Ten-year-old Tony Petley may have failed in his bid to fly with the crew of a Liberator bomber from Old Buckenham in 1944, but he was more successful in another wartime

role...as a spy-hunter. Here's the second part of his wartime memoir.

Despite my father's instruction, I

continued to go to the airfield on a

regular basis. It had become an essential part of my young life. Occasionally though, I would devote time to another exciting pursuit in support of the war effort...spy-hunting.

The unlikely setting for this operation was The Warren, the wooded area on the other side of the village from the aerodrome. And, improbable though it seems, one day my spy-catching ambitions actually turned into a real-life drama.

I was standing just inside the wood when a stranger cycled slowly past. A little further on he got off his bike and pushed it off the road and among the trees. He was acting very furtively and I crept towards him and hid behind a holly bush about 20 yards away. My mouth was dry with fear and my heart was thumping so loudly I was sure he would discover me. I saw him look at his watch for about a minute and then take a shoe box off the carrier on his cycle. He opened it up and took out a radio, pulled up an aerial and began speaking into a microphone. I could not hear what he said but after a minute or two, he replaced the apparatus, made

his way back to the road and, ensuring the coast was clear, cycled away.

I was still almost petrified with fear but I crept to the edge of the road and watched him disappear around a corner. And then I ran, like I had never run before, across the fields and home.

My father was there when I burst into the yard and asked me what was the matter. I breathlessly recounted what I had witnessed and he immediately got on his bike and rode to the nearest phone box. It was some weeks later when Dad told me he had phoned the police with my story and they had caught the spy, complete with his transmitter, about five miles away in East Harling.

As more and more evacuee children came to our school, a shift system of lessons was adopted to cope with the increased numbers. My friends and I attended morning classes for a week and then afternoon classes the next week. This gave us more time to spend on the aerodrome.

One midsummer day, a friend and I went to the airmen's huts and found the crews had all been give the day off. Some were going to Norwich for the afternoon and asked me whether I should like them to bring me something back. I said the only thing I wanted was a book about Liberators and to my delight they bought me just that, a book titled "Bombers at War".

Whilst they were away, we went over to a hut where one of the ground crew was sitting on the doorstep cleaning his overalls in a bathtub filled with aviation fuel. My friend even gave him a hand by washing his cap. I had a box of matches with me and suggested my pal put a little fuel on the ground about 15 yards away so I could set fire to it and see how it burned. While the airman was distracted, my friend carried some fuel over in his cap. Stupidly we didn't appreciate how flammable the fuel was or notice the trail that the leaky cap had left on the ground.

I struck a match and to my horror the flame raced back to the bath of fuel which immediately burst alight. For some reason, the startled airman dragged the blazing tub inside the hut. His panicked colleagues rushed over with extinguishers and put the fire out, but not before the flames scorched paint on the walls and singed some bedding.

As well as finding out about aeroplanes, I also learned a lot about life from what I saw and heard around the airfield. Sometimes I would see prostitutes loitering on

the road leading to the base. There were also occasional feuds between airmen which were only to be expected considering the enormous stresses they were under.

I witnessed one argument between my gunner pals in Captain Love's crew. The tail gunner called for his colleagues to take turns in the tail turret as it was the most hazardous and demanding position. His suggestion was adopted but it led to some ill-feeling between the men. On one mission, the top gunner returned to his own position after a spell in the tail to find a pair of gloves there. After they disembarked from the plane at Old Buckenham, and discovering the gloves belonged to the official tail gunner, he told him: "If I'd known they were yours I'd have thrown them out over Germany." I was often invited to share food (or "chow" as they called it) with the airmen. On one occasion a waist gunner called Red Brummel walked up to the hot plate to get his meal. He selected a generous helping of meat, vegetables and gravy - with grapefruit and custard for pudding. As he went to take his seat, he stood on the catering officer's toes. The latter was a short, rotund man with a bovish voice. There was little love lost between him and the aircrew, and on this occasion his pride was probably hurt as much as his foot. "You bloody gunners think you own the place, but you will not stand on my toes. You'll find yourself on a charge, aircrew or no aircrew," his piping voice railed at Red, to the great amusement of the other diners.

But there was, of course, always a more serious side to life on base where the dangers faced by those who took to the air were sometimes

cruelly demonstrated within sight and sound of the village. They included at least three instances of Liberators exploding on, or shortly after, take-off.

One of these disasters happened on a Sunday morning as I was going home from Sunday school. My brother, his friend and I went across the fields to look at the wreckage but we were spotted and chased away as there were still live bombs scattered around which were about to be detonated. I was first out of the danger area but, on looking back, my brother and his friend were nowhere to be seen, so I went back to find them. Suddenly I stumbled across them taking cover in a ditch along with the man who had been pursuing us. "Get into the ditch, they're blowing bombs," he shouted. And we had to stay there while the air-splitting blasts went on around us. Lused to listen on the radio to Lord

Haw-Haw, the Nazi propogandist,

and one night I heard him say that movie star Jimmy Stewart was flying from Old Buckenham. "How do you men of the 453rd at Old Buckenham feel with a famous film star in your midst?" he sneered. Thankfully for all of us, the efforts and sacrifices of my American friends and their allied comrades in the air, on land and at sea were eventually rewarded with victory. To a small boy, however, for whom it had all been a great adventure, there was inevitable disappointment in the realisation that the focus of my life for over a year was coming to an end, and my friends would be taken from me to resume their lives in a far-off country.

Acceptance of this deprivation was made somewhat easier, though, by an event which took place a few weeks before the end of the war. My idol, Captain Love, and his crew were shot down over Holland. Fortunately all survived but they

were sent straight back to the States. I suppose I knew then that my romance with the 453rd was over and Old Buckenham would never be the same again. Larry Love did, however, write to me for many years after the war, as did the gunners who had befriended me and continued to regard me as their little English mascot.

Robin Anthony (known as "Tony")
Petley was born in Old Buckenham
where he attended school. He lived
all his life in the village and
neighbouring Attleborough, and
will be remembered by many as the
driver of a baker's delivery van. He
died in 2005 aged 71.

increases in costs. The major costs are investments in our future viability. Although the hall is in a good place financially, it has had to rely increasingly on paid professionals rather than volunteers.

General public questions were next and the only member of the public there expressed his support for the drama productions invited to use the hall and hoped they would continue.

The chairperson hoped that new members could be recruited to the committee to help with succession planning and ensure the future of the Village Hall as a resource for the whole village.

The next AGM will be on Wednesday 2 April 2025.

More news from Village Hall

The Village Hall Management Committee met on Wednesday 3 April. Those present were Eileen Oliver, Chairperson; Richard Crawley, Secretary; Grahan Dye, Treasurer; Jane Kelly, Booking Clerk; Pete Twissell, Parish Council representative; Alison Frank; Rosemary Pratt; Terry Cook and Tracey Hayden.

Following the AGM, all trustees had expressed a willingness to continue on the committee and in the post they held so an election was unnecessary. The Chairperson

announced that she would stay on for another year. The secretary and the booking clerk announced that they were planning to move house but would be willing to stay on in post until such time that they move away but were also willing to stand down whenever the committee wished to replace them to establish continuity for the committee. In view of three upcoming vacancies on the committee, it was felt important to recruit members and invite user groups to put representatives forward to the committee. There were user groups who had no reps on the committee and other bodies that might be considered such as the Bookshop, the pubs and the parents' associations. The treasurer will email users groups and put a notice in the newsletter to invite responses.

The Parish Council representative brought a proposal that meetings between members of the Parish Council and the Management Committee should be combined with the Parish Council "Saturday Surgery", which occurs on the last Saturday of each month. The committee's view was that the meetings should be between members of each committee and not part of a public meeting. It was proposed that, twice a year, the Parish Council meeting be curtailed

Peter Twissell, The White House, The Green, 07826 375356 early to facilitate a meeting between Parish Council and Management Committee representatives. He also reported that the Parish Council had asked if the Management Committee would be willing for the car park to be used to relieve parking in the village for other events. The committee view was that there were times when this would not be convenient, for example at school drop off and collection times. As for using the car park as an overflow from "Two Wheel Tuesday," it was felt imperative that this be controlled by stewards to prevent overcrowding in the car park, and again care should be taken to avoid times when user groups were parked at the hall. People have sometimes booked the use of car park and Village Hall facilities for Church events, eg weddings and funerals and the same could be done by Two Wheel Tuesday organisers too. The Management Committee wished to emphasise that the car park was not a free

public car park but for hirers of the hall and parents of Primary school children by purchased permits. Volunteers had been found to help when offering the car park to the public over the Air Show weekend. The annual Renewal of Music Licence, Insurance and Hall Master subscription was in hand. The Declarations of Trustees' Eligibility were now all signed and would be sent off to CAN.

The Booking Clerk reported that fewer social events, parties, etc, were being booked, perhaps due to financial constraints. There were good reliable bookings from First Aid in the Memorial Hall on a regular basis but the committee were concerned about the rising costs of utility providers and general maintenance. Anglian Water have been contacted about a possible leak. The Hall has been unable to locate anything internally or externally around the building but this doesn't exclude any underground issues there may be from the meter to our property. Water use has been monitored by taking regular meter readings. Small repair jobs are required around the hall. These are mainly just general upkeep but include cleaning the light fittings and fans which may well require a platform. Village Electricals have been contacted for updates on any work needed as they were

considering some updates to the lighting all round. Whiterod at Snetterton have also been contacted with the markings for the car park. James at the Airfield has been asked about the upkeep of the little museum in the Memorial Room and he is hopeful about updating the displays in the cabinets at the same time. An ant invasion occurs in the same spots every year at the hall but it is particularly early this year. It is not helped by the hirers not emptying their bins.

As part of the review of charges the committee were presented with an overview of charges levied by other local Village Halls. Although there were many differences in what was charged over and above the hall spaces, it appeared that Old Buckenham was cheaper all round. This was partly because of lower standard charges and partly because other venues charged extra for kitchen use, bar use and for a minimum two hour booking. It was felt best to scrap the pre- and post-6pm charges and have one single day rate. There should be separate rates for children's parties and social events. The commercial rate will be an additional 25% to the standard rate as agreed at the last meeting. Regular users would be charged less than occasional users as before. To simplify administration, no extra charge

Old Buckenham Parish Council

These notes have been written by the newsletter editor from the draft minutes and so may contain information that is changed at a later date.

Old Buckenham Parish Council met on Thursday 11 April at Old Buckenham Methodist Chapel. Councillors present were Naomi Bailey(Chair), Leslie Evison, Pete Twissell, Stan Burton, Steve Gowers, David Taylor, Doug Irons and Ali McWilliam. Also attending were Jonn Hicks (Clerk) and six members of the public. The minutes of the meeting held Thursday 7 March were approved (7 in favour 1 abstain). *Financial matters.* The Precept payment from Breckland was £11,420.50 which brought the Community Account balance to £30,481.66. Payments of £4093.71 were approved (8 in favour). These included £201.65 to the community car drivers, £100 for grass cutting and £311.61 for membership of the National Association of Local Councils. Also included were the Precept Grants that had been paid: Old Buckenham Village Hall £1000 Old Buckenham Primary School Family Association £250 Old Buckenham Primary School Family Association Preloved £200 Monday Mardle £125 Almshouse Trust £500 Fawns £250 R.O.B.S (?) £250 Windmill Trust £500 Two Wheel Tuesday. David Tranmer has acquired the materials to make good the areas of the Green which were damaged during last year's events. Councillor reports. Ali McWilliam reported that the allotments are beginning to come to life and looking very tidy. She said the drainage ditch inside the perimeter needs clearing and the Clerk is to write to the land owner to request

this is undertaken sooner rather than later.

Pete Twissell has removed a section of the new hedging on the Recreation Area to allow access for a tractor and has replanted the removed saplings on the footpath side of the field. He also reported that the Village Hall committee would like to meet with the Parish Council during May. He had also spoken to the Village Hall Committee regarding the use of their car park when Two Wheel Tuesday is taking place. Their committee was not opposed but will need to check that the hall is not in use on those nights so that is no conflict of use. The Clerk to suggest to David Tranmer that he makes a donation to the hall at the end of each season as a goodwill gesture.

Steve Gower reported that he has gained another two volunteers for the community Speedwatch group. Also that the batteries for the SAM Sign need replacing and that they available from Westcote at £86 each. The Clerk to investigate if can get them for a better price through his employer.

David Taylor asked about overgrown footpath from the Country Park to New Buckenham. Naomi Bailey has had correspondence with the 'owners' of the bench that has been flooded by the waters in Ottomer Pond and the bench base concerns which will be reviewed when it is safe to do so. Following a meeting with Highways she now has written correspondence that Highways are not responsible for the ditch, roadway or pathway leading up to the Primary school. Should anybody wish to clear a ditch on their property and they have been told by Highways they are not allowed to, this is wrong as they are in fact allowed to. Highways do not have the budget to clear every ditch in Norfolk and are grateful for the help from residents.

Also Naomi Bailey reported that she, Leslie Evison and the Clerk had a meeting with the Highways Engineer at NCC who has ensured everyone that Old Buckenham is on the list for drainage and ditch clearing as well as pot hole repairs but also pointed out that due to the severe weather this winter they are rather busy but he will chase contactors. They also pointed out that the new steps they fitted at Manor Corner were rather a poor effort considering the cost of the project. The Clerk informed him that the Parish Council felt let down with the quality of the steps

and the work involved.

infilling of the ditch at West View
Farm.

The Chair and the Clerk received a letter from MP George Freeman asking to attend a meeting for which he has been formally invited (the monthly surgery in May). Action Log updates. Doug Irons and Steve Gowers gave all members a run through of the electronic version of the action log and also asked all members to keep this updated so that the Parish Council can report to village each month what has been done and what is still needed.

Celebrating village life

Links with Old Buckenham dating back more than 100 years were celebrated this week when members of one of the village's best known families made a sentimental journey back in time. Focus of the gathering was "the Boy from Rod Alley", John Loveday, whose book of that title has stirred the imaginations of villagers present and past. Descendants of some of those mentioned in his memoir about growing up in Old Buckenham in the 1930s were among those who met at the Gamekeeper for a celebration of family and friendship. The pub - called The White Horse in John's day – is just yards away from where their parents and

grandparents lived and worked in a very different era of local trade, employment and education. John turns 98 this week and was unable to make the journey himself from his care home near Basingstoke but was instrumental in promoting the visit. His daughter Sharon Brunsden drove up from Berkshire accompanied by her uncle, John Houchin - originally from Attleborough - and Don Cronshaw, the son-in-law who grew to love the village after his marriage to Marina, John Loveday's late daughter.

Sharon and her cousins Caroline Lindenmayer, Vivienne Robinson and Kelly Loveday – all grandchildren of Tom and Kathleen Loveday, who lived at 4 Rod Alley Row – were also joined at the Gamekeeper by John's sister Barbara Robinson.

Others with roots in the village attended as well; some had never met the Loveday family members before but have been corresponding regularly about their shared links with village history. They included Tom and Cynthia Walshe. Tom's mother, Marjorie and grandfather, Wiggy Westfield, were mentioned in the book, Marjorie having been born in the same year as John. Richard Styles also attended. His sister, Betty, knew John well and their father,

Charlie, was one of the village's longest lived residents, reaching the age of 101 before his death in 2009. Newsletter and blog editor Ron Brewer was also present to record the occasion for village interest.

Conversation was lively and amusing with many interesting historical facts arising. Sharon said that she had wanted to meet those who had been so interested in her father's book and keeping in touch with him. She added that John Loveday's love for, and interest in, Old Buckenham village life remains as strong as ever.

Jewel of a meeting
